Cornish Cookery part 2

Some weird recipes

We have had some fish 'starters' but often served as a main course, or only course. Here are some soups with meagre ingredient

Kiddley Broth

Boil several onions, a few marigold heads a few stalks of scifers (the tall grasses that indicate where peat is to be found), chopped fine, a lump of butter, pepper and salt.

Put into a basin and pour boiling water over with bread cut into squares. Eat as hot as possible.

Or another version: boil a few onions, strain the liquid into a basin with bread cut into squares, pepper salt (salt to taste) and a lump of butter

Milk Sops

A bedtime snack. Cut a slice of bread into big thick square and put into a basin, cover with hot milk and sugar to taste.

Raw Tatie Fry

Peel a largish potato and cut into squares, Place in hot oil, in a frying pan and fry until soft. Add pepper and salt. Ready to eat

Main Meals

Pigeon Pie

8 oz short crust pastry 3 pigeons 6oz bacon 1 large onion sliced 2 hard boiled eggs, nutmeg, 1 tablespoon flour $\frac{3}{4}$ pint pigeon stock pepper salt and cayenne pepper.

Make the pastry and chill while preparing the rest. See that the pigeons are well cleaned put hot boiling salted water over and cook 1 hour. Lift out and cool.

Take the meat from the bones and reserve Hard boil the eggs.

De-rind the bacon, chop into a dice put into a pan over moderate heat and cook until fat runs out.

Take out and put into a pie dish together with some fat the that softened the onion. Add nutmeg, herbs flour and cook for 1 minute gradually adding the stock stirring all the time. Add more if needed to cover the pigeon meat and bacon in the pie dish.

Pour over stock making sure it comes halfway up the dish. Top with hard boiled eggs and season well.

Roll out the pastry to fit dampen the edges and lay it on. Brush with some milk and bake in oven 400degrees for 20 mins then lower to 350 for another 15mins until nicely golden on the top.

Rabbit Pie or Chicken Pie is made in a similar manner as that above using one chicken or rabbit.

My likky pie recipe is to be found in the St Neot Church Recipe Book

Muggety Pies are all made from there pots or innards of animals:

1. from a Sheep's Pluck
2. the long cord of a calf
3. the pots of a pig washed, with plenty of onions placed in a pie dish with pepper and salt Cover with pastry and bake.

Cornish Pasty

There is no need for a recipe or for the Pasty which is made of skirt beef, potato, onion and turnip. A Pasty Pie is often preferred for picnics in East Cornwall.

Squab Pie

made from young pigeons and apples but variations are from gizzards etc of ducks, mutton, but all with sliced apples in a pie dish covered with pastry and baked.

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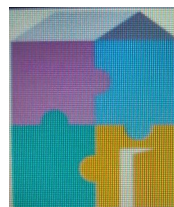
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St Neot Local Produce Market

St Neot and District WI Report: May 2023

On 25th April the St. Neot and District WI hosted a presentation on ADHD and Autism which was open to all members of the community. The presentation was made by Claire Finnigan-Vyse who has formed the group Get Together-Cornwall with the objective of bringing together those who have a connection, diagnosis or who are awaiting a diagnosis of Autistic Spectrum Disorder (ASD), and to provide support and information which is not available in the professional environment. The support group enables all family members to meet others who are affected by ASD and provides a safe and stimulating environment, with up to date parent lead advice and signposts for services.

A psychologist who was only diagnosed with ASD herself when in her early 40s, Claire has 3 sons who all have ASD as well as other health issues. All have attended university and studied psychology, criminology and genetics. When talking about the needs of those with ASD Claire stressed that autism is not an excuse for a particular behaviour, but an explanation. She explained that girls are very good at masking, which is one reason for the late diagnosis they receive. She advised to listen and encourage ASD sufferers to say what needs fixing for them and to ask them how it can be fixed. Get Together-Cornwall aims to give a voice to those with ASD and to celebrate the positivity about being on the Spectrum. We then enjoyed our picnic suppers before tackling the quiz which had been organised by Janina. Working in groups we had to identify which planet is 3rd nearest to the sun; which bird has the fastest flight and what is a cottonmouth amongst other wide ranging questions, with a box of chocolates given to the winning table.

Neighbours Together

St. Neot, Warleggan & Mount Community Support Group

Can you help look after those who are ill, recovering from surgery or end of life?

Although the health service and other health professionals do support those above, they only have limited funds and staff. We recently had a situation where a person was diagnosed with cancer and told they were end of life. The person wanted to die at home but had no one to support them. Neighbours Together along with the person's friends, stepped in to help provide water, turn a fan on and off, open and close windows, empty urine containers, feed and walk the dogs etc. The NHS provided carers twice a day and after a while Marie Curie and another company sat with the person overnight. We did a pretty good job of filling in the gaps between the carers but there were still times the person was on their own during the night and day. Although we have almost 30 volunteers, it's not everyone's cup of tea, or they have their own commitments, jobs, families etc, so I'd like to invite more residents living in the St. Neot, Warleggan and Mount area who be unfazed in these circumstances to join us.

It takes a special type of volunteer, someone who is quiet (can occupy themselves e.g. reading a book, knitting), doesn't fuss, is calm, efficient, ideally can prepare meals (will need a Food Safety certificate, a course for which we can provide free), and most importantly is discrete and can keep information confidential. Whether you are happy to sit with someone for an hour or two or regularly during the day or night (we particularly need night sitters), please contact me.

With regards to the person above, working with the GPs, carers and the Palliative and District Nurses and the person concerned, they were moved into hospital on Monday and today (Thursday) passed away (so out of the 21 days since the person was diagnosed, we helped them stay at home for 18 of them).

We are also looking for more volunteers to be hospital drivers and food shoppers – buying and delivering and/or taking residents shopping.

Rector's Ramblings – Midsummer Calmness

Since moving into the vicarage and starting work in the Benefice in September it has been a series of events, activities and things following on from one another. It is very much a 'happening place'.

A huge thank you to all have made all the events we've held so special. In April we held our annual meeting and thank you to all those who have agreed to hold office for another year. Deborah Wheatley stepped down from the Church Council and we reported that at Christmas Rose Wilton ended her role for the flowers in church. We are very grateful to both Rose and Deborah for all they have given in service to the parish and for the ways they will contribute to our life in the future. Liz Neal has kindly agreed to take over Rose's duties and we are very thankful for the various ways Liz gets on with doing things. Martin Eddy replaces Deborah on the Church Council and of course brings with him a wealth of experience of service in the community.

Symbols play an important role in our lives.

We saw this at the Coronation in which a glove and spur amongst other intriguing items said something about the values of a constitutional monarchy and how flags and inflatable crowns say something quite profound about who we are in terms of our national identity. Whilst back in January the Cornish hymns and music sung at our Celtic Eucharist express the love we have for Cornwall, whether as our birthplace or our adopted home.

Similarly, Baptism is not simply about initiation and joining the church, but it is in part a profound service of thanksgiving for new life, just as a church wedding is about bringing one of the most important relationships in our lives for God's blessing. (And please remember we are always open and happy about those who might want to talk about Baptism or a wedding in church.)

Recently I officiated at the funeral of a family friend and I was reminded how the rituals and customs around death are an important part of the healing that is necessary for those left behind. Funerals are as much out of respect for those who have died as they are for those we leave behind.

On Easter Day several people said how they had appreciated the various services we held during Holy Week. I think this comes from the fact the journey through Holy Week explores a whole range of emotions.

From a sense of abandonment as the altars are stripped on Maundy Thursday, the light switched off and the congregation are thrust into darkness, to the noise and exuberance of the glatter of celebration on Easter Eve when we proclaim the resurrection with bells, drums and rattles. These curious rituals and traditions evoke an emotional response within us.

And as I write this article, I have just returned from a Dawn Ascension Day service, held on the top of Carburrow Tor over at Warleggan at 4.30 am – there is something powerful about sitting on top of the world above the mist at sunrise, reflecting on the Ascension and the utter beauty of the parishes in which we live!

Symbols and actions touch us and express something that wordy explanations cannot.

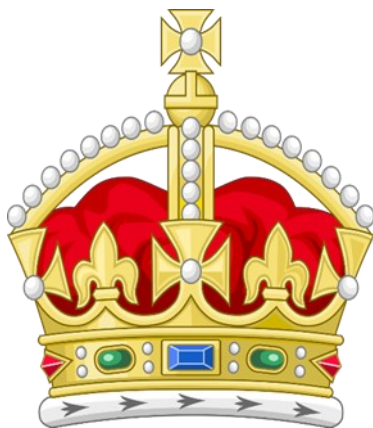
